- Recite the Creed.
- Make pilgrimages to sacred places.
- Practice works of mercy.

What is a Jubilee Year?

In the Old Testament, a Jubilee year was held every fifty years. The year was a time of universal pardon where slaves were freed and debts were forgiven. The Jubilee was seen as an opportunity to re-establish a relationship with God, with each other, and creation. In 1300, Pope Boniface VIII instituted the first Christian Jubilee. Since its establishment, the church has designated each Jubilee year as a special year of grace and forgiveness with the opportunity to receive a plenary indulgence.

The Jubilee year of 2025 is entitled "Pilgrims of Hope."

At a time when many countries suffer from war, climate change, and financial hardship, Pope Francis hopes that the Jubilee year is an opportunity to restore hope, a time for renewal and rebirth. The Jubilee year begins on the eve of Christmas, 2024, with the opening of the Holy Door in the Basilica of St Peter's, Rome, and will close on the feast of Epiphany in 2026.

ST MARY'S BEAULY: A DESIGNATED PILGRIM CHURCH.

St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church in Beauly, Scotland, has long been a spiritual and historical landmark in the Roman Catholic Diocese of Aberdeen. Designated as a pilgrim church for the Jubilee Year 2025, St. Mary's invites reflection not only on its history but also on the broader historical and religious significance of the area.

HISTORICAL ORIGINS AND CONNECTION TO BEAULY PRIORY

The roots of St. Mary's can be traced back to the profound monastic tradition that shaped the spiritual landscape of Beauly. Built in the Gothic Revival style, St. Mary's reflects the architectural trends of the time, with its elegant design and attention to detail symbolising the renewal of Catholic faith and heritage in the region. Its dedication to the Virgin Mary echoes the Marian devotion that was central to the spiritual life of Beauly Priory, creating a tangible link between the two sacred sites.
